What do all of these words have in common? They are just some of the values identified as being important to the community of St. James' Episcopal Church. Sitting on top of a rolling hill in the middle of the beautiful landscape of Healdsburg, surrounded by sunshine, good food, and crisp air, the Vestry tackled the important task of examining what we've done in the past and imagining where we might turn our energies towards in the future. To start, we brainstormed a list of what we found valuable in our community. Then we built from there.

Through our prayerful conversation, we soon realized that everything we do — from worship to celebrations, from reaching out to studying together — all of these things should be examined through this overarching question:

How do we make God present in our families, our church, our neighborhood, our town, and our world?

If what we are doing does not make God present in some way to some person, then it is our challenge to question whether we should be doing it. If the programs we offer do not seek to deepen a relationship with God, then we must wonder if the program is effective. If how we are Church together does not communicate the Love of God to all people, then it is our responsibility to tweak it enough so that the Good News becomes our primary purpose and reason for being.

This is not always an easy thing to do. So often we fall into the habitual movements of the past. It is how we've always done it, it is what is

comfortable for us, it is part of our history and we have a hard time letting go. Yet, we also know that living organisms change and transform. They adapt to current environments and reach for better, more life-giving ways. To that end, each vestry cluster will be asking if how or what we do is the best, most life-giving way of making God present. When the answer is "maybe not," then change will happen to better align ourselves with our mission of sharing God. When the answer is "absolutely," then we will seek to increase that energy.

We, Saint James' Episcopal Church in Fremont, California, have amazing, dedicated, thoughtful, and wise leaders. We will do great work together; work that is wholesome, healing, transformative, and lifegiving for all who are with us and all who come near us.

May God continue to bless us.

Stewardship Corner

Putting Off God's Priorities

(from The Stewardship Study Bible)

It's easy for fear, rationalization and excusemaking to disguise themselves as "forethought" and "prudence" when God asks us to move forward by faith. It's easy to tell ourselves to avoid hasty plans or to be certain of our footing before forging ahead. After all, good stewardship means having our priorities and our households in order. And when it comes to our giving, we shouldn't overextend ourselves, right?

The prophet Haggai directly rebuked these kinds of excuses and reminded the exiles who had returned to Jerusalem that the time to engage in God's work is always now. When you are thinking about giving of your time, talents or money, what are some things that hold you back?

- ◆ To what extent do you struggle in faithful giving: in giving willingly, generously, joyfully?
- What fears regarding giving and generosity hold you back?
- ♦ How do you serve people who are in need, or do you feel it's someone else's responsibility?
- ♦ How do you go about seeking God's direction regarding opportunities to give special gifts to God's work in addition to your regular giving?
- ◆ Do you feel some things in your lifestyle could be changed so that you could give more generously to God's work?
- What areas in your lifestyle could be changed so that you could spend more time helping at church or in the community?
- In what areas are you sensitive to stewarding your resources? In what ways do you live in a responsible manner toward the earth's resources?

- To what extent is your giving to God's work commensurately generous in light of your ability?
- ◆ Do you sense a spirit of joy as you give, serve or help others?

Martin Luther once called the book of Haggai "the easiest of all the prophets" because his message was clear-cut. Haggai simply tells God's people to reorder their priorities; God's work must come first; God's house must be built, even if it means putting God's work before our own comforts. While the prophet's message is easy to understand, it is hard to obey, especially for contemporary Christians.

This goat will not be wandering around campus but will be given to a family in need. The class now needs to decide what their next aim will be – maybe a flock of geese or a trio of rabbits or even a sheep to donate. Watch out for more fundraising efforts.

Heifer International encourages people to sponsor a gift of livestock for a family in the USA or overseas. Along with the gift (a goat, rabbits, ducks, a heifer or chicks) comes the training needed and families are able to improve their diet, earn money and, as we have learned in Sunday School, even improve other crops by adding manure to their soil. Something Good From the 'Fiscal Cliff"

If you know people who are 70.5 or older, you may have some good news for them: The recent "Fiscal Cliff" legislation permits one to pay their 2013 parish pledge out of their IRA and, thus, bypass having it taxed. What a great opportunity!

Normally IRA owners of this age are required to withdraw a certain amount each year from their account and add it to their taxable income. But this new law, without changing the amount that must be taking out of their IRA, permits them to contribute these funds directly to their church or other charity and, thus, reduce their 2013 income taxes.

For seniors, this opens another "pocket" to finance their pledge. They may also use their tax-free IRA to make a one-time donation, of up to \$100,000, to create a named endowment fund, or for some other special purpose.

Be a Rebel, Read the Bible

For Lent the Rev. Lori Walton will start us on a journey that will transform some people's lives. Be a Rebel, Read the Bible – in a year.

Don't we read the Bible during our Liturgical Calendar in church every three years? No, only certain parts deemed important by the Church. What do you mean, "Read the Bible?"

? I mean read the whole Bible, stem to stern, front to back, Genesis to Revelations. Wouldn't that take a long time? Yes, it could. But with a plan you could read it in a year. Only a year? Surely, you jest. No. And my name isn't Shirley.

So, here is the plan. Starting in Lent.... You mean Lent will last all year? No, but as a time of reflection, what a way to start transforming yourself by doing something you have always wanted to do, should have done.

Starting in Lent on Tuesday nights, we will initiate the Reading of the Bible, a little bit each day, some Old Testament, a Psalm, and some New Testament. We'll actually try some different types of Bible study to supplement our daily reading during our Lenten Tuesday night sessions.

CONCERT REVIEW John McCutcheon - January 21, 2013

Jim Cunningham said with enthusiasm, "It's his best concert ever!" To those who had missed his first nine concerts at St. James' came comments like, "Where have I been to have missed such great performances"? Indeed John McCutcheon's performance could be deemed a treasure; stories and songs, even a tutorial on playing the Jaw Harp, all made for a delightful evening. From the traditional 900 Miles to John's recently composed "Forgotten" to songs we sang with him like "Kindergarten Wall," the concert was rich with humor and meaning.

Interestingly, John faced the hammer dulcimer to the side this year so most of the audience could get a better view of the strings and hammers and the delicacy of the way one plays the instrument. Speaking of instruments, he brought the same instruments as last year, commenting on the number of them in his remembrance of Mike Seeger, with the exception of the Jaw Harp, of which he displayed three. After demonstrating them and encouraging folks to learn to play the Jaw Harp, he played a tune on the Russian one and sang.

Meaning went beyond singing and story telling. John introduced Bonnie Burger of Fremont Friends of the Library for whom we had set up a table so she could make the community aware of their goals. John also donated one dollar for each CD/DVD/book he sold to our local Friends of the Library. The Rev. Lori Walton introduced Louis Chicoine and his wife Colleen in the audience. Louis serves as Executive Director of Abode Services, working to eliminate homelessness in our community. St. James' will donate a portion of the concert ticket proceeds to Abode Services.

Before the Prize Drawing at intermission the din in the parish Hall strained one's auditory senses. As

So now, with ten years at St. James' and 33 on the "left" coast and 40 years of touring, John McCutcheon is still singing strong, telling stories and spreading love around as he travels.

2012 Annual Meeting

The Rev. Lori Walton opened the meeting around 11:30am on Sunday, January 20th. In her address, she said that St. James' had become a vibrant center of spiritual transformation. Some new and notable activities are:

- ♦ The participation of our church is growing in the new Sacred Space Program to offer a meal and Holy Communion to the homeless on Sundays in Hayward;
- ♦ Abode Kids program in which our kids bring stories and snacks for the children at Sunshine village:
- ♦ The Filipino Independent Church has started a second church service on Saturday evenings.

She also thanked and presented gifts to the outgoing Vestry Members, Laura Winter, Nancy Castenada, Brad Hoffman, and Steven Ferro.

Senior Warden Janet Fischer thanked the Vestry in their decisions and actions to distribute the Schaeder Memorial Funds to facilitate the following:

- ♦ Helping in the purchase of clergy housing;
- ♦ Parking lot restoration;
- ♦ Little Church renovations:
- Establishing the Children, Teen and Family program.

She noted that the total income from fund raising was \$7,956 thanks to the McCutcheon Team and our Duck-for-Bucks reps Brad Hoffman and Tom Blalock. Ducks-for-Bucks gave us \$1294.

The congregation approved the appointment of Jack Rux to fulfill the term of Valle Brokes and later unanimously elected four new Vestry members, Al Casas, Ralph Locher, Dave Nelsen and Alison Saichek.


Treasurer Lynn Locher reported that 2012 was a good year financially for us. Pledges paid equaled Pledges pledged. The Building Fund has a \$24,000 balance. In Outreach, the Vestry has allocated monies for AEMCH, Abode Services, Sacred Space, Viola Blythe Community Services and Shield the Vulnerable background checks as well as a new line item allocating monies for a Mutual Ministry Review.

Outgoing Endowment Board Chairman Dave Nelsen gave us an update on the Endowment Fund. The 12/31/2012 value was \$123,100, from which it authorized a payment of \$4,551, which is 5% of the 12 Quarter Rolling Average Value. Dave presented checks of:

- 1. \$2,288 for the Operating Budget to Senior Warden Janet Fischer;
- 2. \$1,311 for the Memorial Garden to Ruth Poole;
- 3. \$951 for the Little Church Restoration to Sylvia Ma.
