## Day Trippers

This past Memorial Day weekend I met up with my friend and colleague Pralay, who works at my company's office in New Delhi. He was visiting San Jose to work with his US-based team on a new project, but as luck would have it his India-based travel agent wasn't familiar with US holidays, and so there he was with a 3-day weekend in a land far from home. Remembering our conversations of the copious amount of time my family spend in Monterey, he'd booked himself on a day excursion from the Bay Area to the Monterey Peninsula, recalling my tales of beaches, seals, pine trees and an aquarium. He hadn't pre-arranged any of this with me, but as luck would have it we were in Monterey that day and so I met him outside the Monterey Bay Aquarium, wrapped in extra layers to keep out the late May fog. "You've come a long way! Welcome to Monterey."

"Thank you, Mike. I've heard you speak so much of this place and all the good works done here, I wanted to see it for myself", he smiled. "How long have you got?" I asked. "40 minutes", he replied.

Now, if you've ever been to the Aquarium, you'll know that 40 minutes isn't enough time to do it justice, so I led him on the express tour – a taste of the biggest and most impressive exhibits, dashing from otters to kelp, tuna to anchovies. The time passed very quickly, but he was certainly impressed – it lived up to its billing, and he took away a Seafood Watch card so he could share the message of sustainable seafood, and the conservation work of the aquarium with his family back home.

Forty minutes? Really?

Two weeks later, I found myself in Jerusalem on Pentecost Sunday. I know many people who have planned their pilgrimages to the Holy Land long in advance, and explored the region for several weeks (or even months). There I was, on a last minute flight for a business meeting that would enable me to spend

just one day exploring. With travel from Tel Aviv on a minibus of tourists, that really meant two and a half hours in the old city to see all of the sights on our guide's itinerary, and while Jerusalem was a lot smaller than I'd imagined, we really had to hustle. Through the Upper Room (of the Last Supper and Pentecost itself), along alleys to the Wailing Wall (10 minutes – keep it quick, you can always email your prayers later and they'll write them and push them in the cracks for you), finishing at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre – the place of Christ's crucifixion and burial. The place was packed with visitors and pilgrims from all over the globe, a throng of believers and tourists all waiting their turn to get close to holy places.

Jerusalem in half a day? Really?

Of course, I'd have liked more time in Jerusalem much as my friend would have liked more time on his visit to Monterey, but as my guide shared with me: "You know the stories, you know what happened here. Now you get a glimpse of this place with your eyes". I got to take away an experience that maybe I'll never be able to repeat, a new context that in the weeks and months ahead I'll digest and reflect upon; an experience to share with my friends and family, just like Pralay. I'm thankful for that opportunity.

## RECYCLE --- RECYCLE

For the past several years, Alameda County and The City of Fremont have had a Recycling program where homeowners were asked to separate trash into different categories for disposal, some for recycling, some for organic disposal, and some for disposal in a landfill.

This policy was not fully implemented for commercial or business properties; thus St. James had a policy of almost All trash being thrown into the dumpster and paper and flattened boxes being placed in the blue recycle rolling bin. **THIS POLICY IS CHANGING.** The upgraded policy now calls for not only paper and flattened cardboard boxes ( 3'x3' or less) in the recycle bin, but clean glass or plastic bottles, aluminum cans and plates, magazines, catalogs, and newspapers also should be placed in the recycle bin.

For now, our yard trimmings, work party cleanings food scraps and food soiled paper should continue to be placed in the Dumpster with the Garbage. Posters regarding this program are placed in the kitchen, and the copy Room. Soon, we will acquire additional bins to be placed in our buildings to facilitate these changes.

## Vestry Meeting

The Vestry met on Thursday, June 12<sup>th</sup>, to discuss the work of the parish. Several parishioners joined this busy meeting to discuss some very exciting ministries.

Sylvia Ma, Bruce Roberts and Jim Cunningham, representing the Little Church Renovation Committee, presented possible scenarios for phase III repairs; Bowing Walls. The vestry approved their request to release funds for an engineering firm to perform feasibility studies, engineering calculations and review the engineering plans for the repairs.

Bruce Roberts and EJ Hilliard presented an application for a new ministry; working with Tri-City Volunteers. Interest in a new ministry which St. James' members might become involved began during the Lenten Soup Supper Series in March and April when we examined Food-Equality and Food-Insecurity in America. The vestry happily approved this new ministry and we look forward to hearing from their team soon.

The vestry was presented with an update of our Emergency Preparedness Bronze Certification. A team led by Elaine Vallecillos-Miller has met for several months learning about the process of completing this plan which has been developed by Episcopal Relief and Development. The first stage of the plan is now complete, the Bronze Plan. The team will continue to fulfill the requirements to achieve two additional levels of certification, the Silver Plan and finally the Comprehensive Plan. Other team members are Steve and Karin White, Al Casas, Bud Spalding, Scott Whitaker, Greg Miller, Dave Nelsen and Mike Scrutton.

We discussed the planning for St. James' Day which will be on July 27. There will be a single service at 10:00, followed by food, games and fellowship with the Philippine Independent Church.

The vestry approved a proposal to convert EB3 and EB4 into a single room as we did with EB1 several years ago. As our Sunday School attendance has grown the current space has become very cramped. This larger space will allow further growth and help enhance the learning experience of our youth. An effect of this project will be losing EB4 as a storage area. To mitigate this the vestry has also approved the purchase of several large storage shelves which will be added to EB5.

We were presented with an update on a new ministry, Congregational Care, being developed by Meg Amouroux, Nancy Castaneda, Karen Koonze and Bev Mosier. You will be hearing more about the exciting work they have done very soon.

**Please note:** The date of the next vestry meeting has been changed. Our July meeting will be held on July 31 beginning at 7:00pm. We will be meeting in the vestry room on that evening. There will not be a meeting in August.

## Little Church Repair and Restoration Plumbing the Walls

No plumbers involved, really. This project requires that the sides of the

Little Church be returned to straight up and down. Right now the walls are farther apart at the top than at the bottom, and even more so in the center of the building compared to the front and rear of the church. We expect that the way to straighten the walls is to install temporary diagonal cross-ties for a period of time to draw the walls in at the top until they are straight up and down (plumb). We think it will take three to four months to complete this part of the project once construction begins. See the “artist’s” rendering of how the diagonal cross-ties would look. During the time the cross-ties are in place, there will be a slight reduction seating in the Little Church. Four pews will be affected, two on each side of the Little Church.

The Vestry has OK’ed the money for an engineering study to determine how to make the walls plumb (or straightening them). The structural engineer will also be looking into two methods of keeping the walls straight for years to come. The first is to use horizontal tension rods that would span the width of the church in three places at the height of the walls. See the accompanying photo with the rods drawn in. The second method would be to replace the wooden buttresses outside the Little Church, three on each side of the church, with steel buttresses. The finished steel buttresses will then be covered to look as they do now.

Element Structural Engineers, Inc. has been recommended by the Committee and selected by the Vestry to perform the study to determine the feasibility of each method of permanently straightening the walls. If only one of them will work, we will choose that method. If both methods will work, we would prefer the buttress method if we can afford it. Our current estimate is that the construction using the buttress method is more expensive.

When will all the construction take place? First we have the engineering study, then we present the results to the Vestry, then we ask construction companies for bids on the project, then comes the construction phase. So it will be some months in the future depending on the time for the engineering study and the time to find a contractor. If you have questions regarding this phase of the Little Church repair and renovation,



## A New Room for the Sunday School

We are growing! Regular Sunday School attendance has doubled this year and we are in need of more space for our learning, work and play. At their last meeting in June, the Vestry approved a Sunday School renovation project which will double the current available space for Sunday School. We now have a firm plan in place to knock out the wall between EB3 and EB4 in order to make one large room (as was done with EB1 and EB6 some years ago). Dave Nelsen will oversee the room renovation, including demolition and reconstruction, and I will oversee the sorting, packing and moving of classroom materials to enable the project.

An enlarged space will allow for a more comfortably formed circle when we gather for welcoming songs, our Bible story, and our feast each Sunday. The additional space will also provide children with more room to spread out in their individual “work time” as well as give more latitude for movement and drama in creative group activities. We will look forward to having flexibility in the space for gathering, art, building, story telling, individual reading and reflection, liturgical action/play, creative movement and more!

Recent articles on church growth have made the astute analogy between plants, pot size and Sunday School rooms. To keep a bonsai small, one keeps the tree in a small pot. The same is true of Sunday Schools. When a room is filled at 80% capacity, program participation ceases to grow. Our capacity in Sunday School is measured by numbers of children (and square footage available), but our children are growing, too! Our new Sunday School room, which will serve children ages 4-11 each Sunday, will give us room to invite friends, welcome newcomers, and fully participate in worship, fellowship and learning with our growing bodies, too!

More than ten years ago St. James’ made a tremendous investment in Godly Play materials for children’s faith formation. Our current room permits us to use only a small fraction of the collection. The new room, however, will enable us to make all the materials fully available to the children on every Sunday. The children of St. James’ are truly blessed with such beautiful and versatile materials for learning, work and play!

Program growth for children also invites increased participation on the part of adults as teachers and

companions. On September 27, St. James’ will host a Godly Play training workshop to strengthen our teaching core. With our new room, we will be able to hold our workshop on-site in our own classroom using our very own materials! This is wonderful! Blessedly, we will also have the space to be able to invite other children’s ministers from nearby parishes in the diocese to join us. We will be so grateful to extend the hospitality and share in furthering children’s ministry in our Episcopal Church.

Plan, plans: big and small....Do you like to sort, recycle, pack, organize, schlep stuff, knock down walls, use tools, clean up, get dirty, paint, decorate, and otherwise do what it takes to remake a space? Dave Nelsen and I welcome any help you may have to offer for the renovation project: for a day, a few hours, or even a week. (Drop-ins welcome!) I will be doing most of the sorting, packing and moving before St. James’ Vacation Bible Camp begins on July 28, but especially between July 1-9 and July 21-27. Dave Nelsen will oversee the room renovation in the month of August. In early September I will oversee moving into the new room after the new carpet is laid. Let us know if you can help!
