Every interaction, every experience, gives us the opportunity to be the spark which ignites another, or the tinder which is set aflame by someone else.

It is the essence of our Christianity, after all, to cultivate a heart that is able to be so open, so willing to see others and to let others see us, that in doing so, we ultimately bring forth Christ. My experience of St. James' is that the fire burns brightly in this place, offering up many opportunities to light the way for others. Safe travels this summer, or holy homesteading, whichever your situation may be. And wherever you go, may you know God's flame.

Would You Like to Make a Will?

The Minister of the Congregation is directed to instruct the people, from time to time, about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families, and of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses (The Book of Common Prayer, Page 445.)

To facilitate Episcopalians making wills, the Diocese of California sponsors a program that provides for a meeting with an estate planning attorney for the creation of a simple will for the extremely modest cost of \$75. This fee is simply to partially reimburse the volunteer attorney for word processing costs.

St. James' will be hosting appointments for writing a will on Saturday, June 23rd between 9:00 am and noon. An appointment generally lasts 45 minutes. You are asked to fill out and bring with you the questionnaire that you receive upon making your appointment.

Your conversation with your attorney and the contents of your will are completely confidential, a matter of attorney-client privilege. You are encouraged to consider including the church in your will but this is entirely up to you.

A will is not a complete estate plan, but it may be a good place to start. The attorney will inform you of other estate planning steps—such as an Advance Directive for Healthcare—that you may wish to consider.

The will preparation cost is \$75.00 per person (\$150 per couple).

St. James' Moving Forward

The year 2012 finds St. James' in the enviable position of being able to improve some of our facilities and to enhance and expand some of our programs. One was to help our Rector to be in a position to buy a home in our community. We have also seen renovation work on the windows of the Little Church. For these blessings we give thanks.

The committee to organize, plan, and coordinate the rest of Little Church renovation has become active and is moving forward.

The **Courtyard Patio** has been evaluated, and restoration and repair will commence on July 2 and continue through most of the month. What appears to be a relatively simple repair will require about two and a half weeks for the necessary setting of the base materials and curing of a new concrete curbing.

There are several other projects being evaluated; such as repairs and restoration of the parking lot, improvements to utilities, and other improvements to our facilities.

In addition to the facilities, other members of your vestry will be evaluating the needs and improvements to our Christian Education and Youth programs. Building on the success of last summer, we will be holding a Vacation Bible School in July and August.

There are many other programs and projects being evaluated by parishioners. Yes, St. James' is on the move.

The 2012 Little Church Renovation Committee met and accepted a bid from a structural engineering firm, Earthquake and Structures Inc. to perform a structural inspection of our Little Church. The inspection will commence upon funding approval by the Vestry.

The Committee is also in the midst of determining the cost of refinishing the pews, the floor and installing new carpet as well as cleaning the walls and ceilings of the Little Church.

The Committee has forwarded a rough estimate of the renovation cost to the Vestry for consideration.


Vacation Bible School Registration



Comforters Guild Members Going Solo

The Comforters Guild members want to thank all the concerned, thoughtful parishioners who have supported us through the years with donations of yarn and money. You strengthened our ministry of knitting and crocheting uncounted lap robes, afghans, hats, and baby sweaters to give to Oakland Children's Hospital, Pathways Hospice, and local convalescent hospitals. The Prayer Shawl Guild will continue, but it's with a feeling of real regret that we are disbanding our Comforters Guild for several reasons. We have virtually no attendance at regular meetings and driving to deliver items has become difficult and expensive. However, we are proud of our accomplishments during these many years and each of us will continue our knitting and crocheting gifts to others.

However, The Prayer Shawl Guild will continue at St. James'. This spiritual practice begins each meeting with a blessing, prayer or wish dedicating the work of our hands and the intentions of the recipient. The special yarns used in Prayer Shawls are purchased by those who knit or crochet them. The shawls are quite long and take a good amount of time to make. When we formed this Guild, we agreed that Prayer Shawls would be for members of our congregation, who may need a little extra love, encouragement, sympathy, or attention. Prayer Shawl members are: Janet Fischer, Chair, Valle Brokes, Barbara Dabney, Linda Nelsen, Connie Rux, Bobbie Tomkinson, and Meg Williams. A large plastic box labeled "Prayer Shawls" is located in the room where the choir vests. In it are a few knitting and crochet needles, a small sewing kit, and labels for the shawls. Patterns and instructions for making prayer shawls can be found in that box and on this website: <http://shawlministry.com/instructions.html>.

Here's a little history: the Comforters Guild at St. James' was begun in the 1990s when parishioner Sylvia Wessel was President and Linda Nelsen and Valle Brokes were members of the diocesan Board of Episcopal Church Women. The program was begun as Comfort for AIDS, serving patients all over the diocese. The first gift for the program was a beautiful red afghan made by Linda Nelsen's Mother. Our first event was a fund-raising concert in St. Mary's University Chapel featuring well known violist Mimi Dye playing music composed by Hildegard of Bingen. Many churches joined the program, and for several years these parishes shared yarn and ideas. Selling cookies made from Hildegard's "Intelligence Cookies" recipe helped raise funds for yarn and supplies. Thanks to new medications, fewer and fewer AIDS patients were

hospitalized. Our program morphed into donations for Children's Hospital and close relationships with The Rev. Arlinda Cosby's Ministry to Convalescent Hospitals and with then Director Ellen Cuzzo and Pathways Hospice.

Our members have not forgotten the most challenging project of our Comforters Guild at St. James'. We also worked with The Rev. Barbara Hill, then a Chaplain at Laguna Honda Hospital in San Francisco, supplying her with afghans and lap robes for patients. Barbara asked us for a special gift. She explained that when patients died at Laguna Honda, the only covering of their remains at funeral services was a large piece of blue paper. Barbara wanted something better for them and asked us to knit or crochet a shroud for their use. We were sympathetic, but we thought that a homemade shroud, knitted or crocheted, would be inappropriate and kind of strange looking. Not only that, but it would have to be very long and large, and we wondered how to do such a huge project. We offered to buy one such as most Altar Guilds have. But Barbara said, "A professional one would not suit the people here. We really need this, and you have given us many wonderful gifts. I know you can do it."

Wow! We said more than a few prayers searching for an answer. At last we thought of knitting machines, which would create a tightly knit, more professional looking piece, but would still be more like one Barbara had in mind. We called people and machine knit classes all over the Bay Area with our strange request. Everyone said something like: "What in the world are you thinking? No, we can't possibly do that." Until at last the Hayward Adult School machine knitting class found three of their students who welcomed the project and said they would work on it for us. They helped us order a fine quality, heavy, white, washable acrylic, invented a pattern, and set out to make two shrouds. As it turned out, we had enough yarn to make three of them. The women who made them became very involved in the project and loved doing it. We had a joint celebration when they were finished.

But our most creative member, Enid Williams, took a look at those huge, oblong, plain white knitted pieces and said, "This will never do. At the very least, we need to add a decorative edge to these." So she invented a crocheted design we called "The Golden Gate Bridge" and taught all of us how to do the stitch. For several meetings we sat around the shrouds spread on the big table in the Vestry Room adding that lovely edge to each one. Needless to say, Laguna Honda Hospital folks were as happy to receive those three shrouds as we were to give them.

Clergy Housing at St. James'

Housing for clergy has always been an issue for churches. In the 1800s, when clergy salary was in the range of \$1000-\$1200 per year, clergy was often "put up" by various members of the congregation on a rotating basis. Later, it became traditional for a church to provide a Rectory, a house that was owned by the church for the Rector and family to live in. Rectories were often located on the church property, as was the St. James' rectory many years ago. (It was located behind the Little Church, when the parish used to own the property behind us.)

Around 30 years ago, St. James' had a new vision of how to assist their Rector with housing. Using seed money donated by a parishioner, we embarked on a plan to supplement the Rector's down payment on a home with church funds in an Equity Sharing Agreement (ESA). This allowed the Rector to lower the mortgage amount and the parish got a modest return on their investment when the house was eventually re-financed or sold. This is always a bit of a risk since if housing prices decreased, our return would also decrease. However, this plan has worked well for 30 years.

We don't need to tell anyone how the housing situation in this country has changed in recent years. Rules and restrictions are tighter than ever, and it is harder than ever for a first-time homebuyer to get into the market. To address the new reality, the Vestry is expanding on the original vision established by those folks 30 years ago who set up the first ESA. We are growing to include down payment assistance as part of the housing package we offer to our Rector. In addition to providing funds to The Rev. Lori so she can move into the parish where serves, we have embarked on a plan to set aside funds each year so we can continue to offer this assistance to future Rectors down the road.

We ask a great deal of our clergy. It is not a typical 9-5 job. We require them to be available whenever there is a pastoral emergency, to be managers of staff, to be fiscally aware and responsible, to grow lay persons into positions of ministry and leadership. We require them to be available for evening meetings (to accommodate *our*

day jobs), and to give sermons that are both inspiring and entertaining. Oh, and they should always be Christ-like as well. Our commitment to our Rector's well-being should be as great as our Rector's commitment to the parish.

Hopefully it will be many years before we need to search for a new Rector. But when we do, this new housing plan will already be in place, and newer parishioners will ask, "Didn't we always do it this way?"
