Holy Week Schedule at St. James'

Palm Sunday, April 1

All our services (at 8, 9, and 11 a.m.) begin in the parish hall and courtyard with the blessing of the palms and a triumphal procession to the church, where we will once again participate in the story of Christ's Passion and Death and a solemn Eucharist.

Holy Wednesday, April 4

Our weekly 10 a.m. Wednesday service will offer a mid-week Eucharist for those who wish to continue their reflections on the meaning of Holy Week.

Maundy Thursday, April 5 at 6:30 p.m.

On this night we remember Christ's meal with his disciples when he instructs them to "Do this in remembrance of me." This year we invite you to participate in our "We Are the World" Maundy Thursday dinner by bringing a vegetarian dish to share. As an act of solidarity with those around the world who live on far less than we do, we will share a meal that is made up of foods low on the food chain by foregoing meats and sugar laden desserts. Come be a part of this festive "We are the World" dinner, where we remember what it means to be the people of God gathered at Christ's holy table in prayer and celebration.

Good Friday, April 6 at 7 a.m., Noon, and 7 p.m.

Join us at one of these three services as we gather together to remember Christ's passion and death and to give thanks to God for a love that conquers death.

What's in a Flag?

How many of these national flags could you recognize?

Uganda, Nicaragua, Philippines, Germany, South Korea, Mexico, Canada, United Kingdom, South Africa, Laos, Australia, China, Hong Kong, Guyana, Peru, Ireland, Costa Rica, India, Poland, Wales, Scotland, Switzerland, Ukraine, Brazil, Fiji, Croatia, Japan, and Vietnam.

If you looked around either of our worship spaces during Lent, you would have seen all of these flags flying somewhere on the premises. These are the countries beyond the United States which are represented by the membership of St. James' – either as the countries of our birth, or as the countries of our parents' birth. And we're not even talking about grandparents or earlier generations!! We also know that this is not a complete list, but only those countries that folks from the congregation told the office about recently.

Do we have a fun and rewarding project for you!

Announcing a new Prayer Shawl Ministry for St. James! The idea is to supply Prayer Shawls to members of St. James who might benefit from such a gift. Such folk might be someone who is ill, in the hospital, has a new baby, needs some loving attention, etc. As you knit or crochet a shawl, you pray and meditate on its healing warmth and comfort. The Prayer Shawl Ministry is a national organization committed to demonstrating that shawls are symbolic of an inclusive, unconditionally loving God and community.

Anyone can participate – no need to be a member of any group. It works like this:

- As you knit or crochet a shawl, pray and meditate on its healing warmth and comfort for the person who will receive it.
- Prayer shawls are collected and blessed in church to be ready when they are needed.
- The shawls are distributed with a prayer by the clergy, the Eucharistic Visitors (EVs), or other visitors.

So the wise and benevolent Senior Warden said unto him, "Look, there's this free service called "Onelist" that will create and maintain an e-mail list for the parish. I'll set it up." And the rector said, "Cool." The list was once again easy to maintain, and the Rector had time to do his other things. And there was great rejoicing.

The days were long, and it came to pass that Onelist was bought by Yahoo. There were no immediate changes to the maintenance of the list, and it was still free. But more things came to pass and the Yahoo list became a vexation to those who needed to use it. Did I mention that it was free? Anyway, the Communications Cluster found a service that would host both the parish's web site AND the e-mail list! Yahoo could be cast out! And there was great rejoicing. The moral of the story is:

Our e-mail list for St. James is now part of saintj.com. If you were already signed up on the Yahoo list, your e-mail address has already been moved over to the new list. If you're new and would like to sign up on the e-mail list, simply DO THIS: Send an email to: majordomo@saintj.com, with the only message in the body of the e-mail in this format: subscribe stjameslist YourE-mailAddress

Example: subscribe stjameslist janetlfischer@yahoo.com

You'll receive an email asking you to confirm your request. Follow the instructions in that e-mail. NO SPAM. NO ADVERTISEMENTS. NO SIGN-UP PROCEDURES LIKE WITH YAHOO. Just send an e-mail. The list is private. Once you are on the list, the e-mail to send messages should be posted to: stjameslist@saintj.com. "And they never complained about the e-mail list again." (Hey, it's a fairy tale, isn't it?)

“Houston, We Have a Problem”

Those of you who remember following the spaceship launches and travels are familiar with the phrase “Houston, we have a problem.” This time, spaceship St. James’ has a problem. We are not seeing the cash flow from pledges that we expected, and our expenses have been heavy for the last two months. To help us, we ask that you please catch up and stay current with your pledge.

There are various ways to remember to pay your pledge:

--- Set up an automatic pay system with your bank.

--- Use *Pay Pal* to automatically pay your pledge.

--- Write your checks for the month at the beginning of the month and keep them in your wallet.

--- Mail your checks to the church in the event that you are ill, out of town, or become very forgetful on Sunday mornings.

In all cases, please include the account number that appears on your pledge envelopes. Your account number enables the counters to credit the appropriate account to you and your statement.

Other opportunities in which you can help are available.

St. James’ is still looking for a few good men and women for volunteer jobs at the church. The once-a-month, Saturday clean up team is a great way to get outside, make the church grounds look better and get to know your church community. Chris Perry can always find some inside job, in the event you do not like outside work.

St. James' Endowment Fund

The St. James' Endowment Fund was established by the Vestry in April 2003 to provide funds to enable the parish to more completely fulfill its mission by developing ministries beyond what is possible through its annual operating funds. The Endowment Fund is "True Endowment," which is maintained separately from other church funds and employs the restriction that the principal shall not be invaded.

At the end of 2006, the Endowment Fund had a balance of \$39,017 divided between \$24,017 in general endowment and \$15,000 in designated endowment for the upkeep of the Memorial Garden. During the St. James' annual meeting held in January 2007, an initial distribution of \$1,054.85 was made to the Vestry for uses limited to: the capital needs of the parish, outreach ministries and grants, and seed money for new ministries, and special one-time projects. Through the generosity of parishioners in the form of memorials and other gifts designated to the Endowment Fund since that time, the fund has already grown by more than enough to replace the \$1054 made in this year's initial distribution.

Disciple Builders Shares: Movies of the Season

For the spirit of the Lenten and Easter seasons, I've gathered up DVD titles about the life of Christ, religious and inspirational films, and somethings on which to reflect. Here you'll find a smattering of Hollywood classics, an engrossing documentary, perhaps something you haven't yet seen. (Many of the reviews are kindly adapted from popular internet movie sites.)

The Passion of the Christ (2004)

Focuses on the last 12 hours of Jesus' life. Controversial when it was first released, it begins in the Garden of Gethsemane where Jesus has gone to pray after serving the Last Supper. Would you say, upon viewing it today, that it is still controversial?

The Greatest Story Ever Told (1965)

Yes, this is classic Max Von Sydow version! It has a elegant sweep and visual splendor that lives up to its title. While there are some questionable interpretations, the performances are strong and the crowd scenes are exciting. It takes dramatic license in setting the scripture and the events, but it does so in a very peaceful and profound way. The script is very well-written, presenting scripture in a poetic, dramatic manner.

Facing the Giants (2006)

While learning that he and his wife face a medical problem, a high school football coach discovers that a group is secretly organizing to have him dismissed from his job. Devastated by his circumstances, he cries out to God in desperation. What transpires is a story of the fight between faith and fear. This is a powerful experience for the whole family, inspiring thoughts of faith, hope, and love.

Woman Thou Art Loosed (2004)

This is the story of a young woman raised in an environment of abuse and molestation at the hands of her mother's boyfriend, which her mother unwittingly condones. Based on a book and subsequent play by the Dallas Bishop T.D. Jakes, it is based on a composite of women for whom Jakes has provided counseling in his ministry. He is committed to the abused women, not only of his congregation, but now to all abused women.

Charlotte's Web (2006)

The new version! The determined spider named Charlotte – who sees miracles in the ordinary – spins words into her web in an effort to convince the farmer that Wilbur is “some pig” and worth saving. The classic story of loyalty, trust, and sacrifice comes to life in this live-action adaptation.

The National Geographic: The Gospel of Judas (2006)

What if an ancient gospel was rediscovered that offered a radically different perspective on a man that history has painted as the ultimate villain? National Geographic provides exclusive access to the documents and evidence that traces the incredible story of what has happened to the Gospel of Judas since it was found. Is the Gospel of Judas real? --- *continued on page 8*

Ducks for Bucks Benefit Race

Saturday, April 28, 2007, 11 – 1 p.m.

For the third year, St. James' is participating in the 'Ducks for Bucks Benefit Race' to be held at Lake Elizabeth. In addition to the race at 1 p.m., a fun, carnival celebration with family games and with raffle prizes is available from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Each duck costs \$5, and this year when you adopt 5 ducks on one entry ticket, the Kiwanis Club of Fremont will add one FREE duck to the entry for a total of 6 ducks in the race!!! Last year, St. James' received a check for \$1194.00 from this benefit race after selling 361 ducks.

Evening Bible Study at St. James'

Evening Bible Study is now available at St. James' on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month from 7 – 8:30 p.m. The group will focus on the Gospel reading for the upcoming Sunday. For more information, contact Brad Hoffman at FBHOFF@yahoo.com, or call the church office.

The group will use *Synthesis CE: A Lectionary Guide in the Episcopal Tradition*. Below is an example of the course study taken from a previous session:

For Sunday March 11, 2007 – Luke 13:1-9

¹Now there were some present at that time who told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mixed with their sacrifices. ²Jesus answered, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered this way? ³I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will all perish. ⁴Or those eighteen who died when the tower in Siloam fell on them—do you think they were more guilty than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵I tell you, no! But unless you repent, you too will all perish."

Interpretation:

We read in today's Gospel of the urgency of the need to repent, an appropriate Lenten Theme. The opening verses of the passage (Lk. 13:1-5) are unique to Luke, and reflect the commonly held conviction that illness and misfortune were God's punishment for sin (cf DT28-30; Jn.9:2-3). This event occurs as Jesus is teaching on his way to Jerusalem. Some in the crowd, who were listening to Jesus' prophecies on judgment (Lk 12:49-59), related an incident that seemed to affirm the connection between sinful behavior and disaster. A number of Galileans were brutally slaughtered by Pontius Pilate's soldiers while they were presenting their sacrifices. In this horrific act, the blood of the victims was mingled with that of their sacrificial animals. Jesus responded by asking if they thought these Galileans were 'worse sinners than other Galileans (vs2) because they suffered this way.

Question #1 – In the Gospel passage, some of Jesus' followers were struggling with the relationship between sin and suffering. How did Jesus address their concerns? How do we come to terms today with unexplained suffering and disaster in our own lives and beyond?

We Invite You to Participate

Hi! Bud and Pat Spalding here. We can be typically found at either the 8:00 or 9:00 Services. We moved to Newark from Pasadena in 1972, but for five months, Pat or I would travel the length of Highway 99 at least once a month until we were able to sell our home. Maintaining this schedule made it difficult to establish the close relationships that we later developed; however, we found that the community at St. James' was very welcoming and inclusive. There were plenty of opportunities to participate in all sorts of activities.

Many members of the congregation were in their fifties or sixties and had been leaders in the community. Some had been in the community since birth, while others had come to Fremont because of job opportunities and the resulting urban growth. Many of these parishioners had been members when the Church was brought from its former location to its present site in the mid 1950s. Many were or had been community leaders and had been the leadership team over the years. While there were many older, long-time members, there also was a large and active group, most of whom were in their 30s and 40s. As the older parishioners became less active due to age and physical limitations, full participation became more difficult, and members of this 30 – 40 year old group moved into the leadership roles. They stepped forward to serve as Vestry and Deanery representatives, Diocesan Standing Committee, Diocesan Council, and as leaders of the Ushers and Acolyte groups.

Thirty years later, we see the cycle repeating. There are some representatives of the older generation, who are still with us, but the ability to participate is severely limited. Many have moved from the area, many now encounter physical limitations and problems that curtail their full participation, some are enjoying a retired life and travel, and unfortunately, some have passed on. Some parishioners from this age group continue to serve in spite of health and physical limitations. Fortunately, several newer and younger parishioners who have stepped forward to fill vacant positions are around. However, there are always places where additional volunteers can step forward and participate in helping St. James function just a little bit smoother.

Some of the areas where assistance would be welcome are in the physical labor at work parties and setting up for social functions. Ushers are important in helping the services move smoothly. Many of the present ushers are at the age and circumstances where they could use periodic relief. Every year, we elect new Vestry members and Diocesan Delegates. The basic requirement for these positions is to be a "member in good standing." It also helps if a member has some business sense and is amenable to discussion and hearing other points of view. There is always a need for parishioners to participate in the services as a Lay Reader, Eucharistic Minister, Eucharistic Visitor, Choir Member, and Acolyte.

The life of a church is like the life cycle of any group or family. There are members who lead, and there are those who follow. But it is important that everyone participates, because as time moves forward, generations will be unable to maintain the pace. Another group will step forward and carry things forward until they, too, will be unable. Disney refers to this cycle as "A Circle of Life," and we invite you to be a part of it just as we chose to be a part of it.
