Money and Happiness

In 2005 London School of Economics economist Richard Layard published a book called *Happiness*, in which he revealed that we are no happier even though average incomes have more than doubled since 1950 and “we have more food, more clothes, more cars, bigger houses, more central heating, more foreign holidays, a shorter working week, nicer work and above all, better health.” There are two reasons we are not happier. One relates to our genetic makeup that accounts for half of our predisposition to be happy or unhappy. The other reason is our wants are relative to what other people have, not to some absolute measure.

Emery University psychiatrist Gregory Berns writes in his book *Satisfaction* that happiness is better equated with satisfaction than pleasure. Berns believes that the pursuit of pleasure lands us on a never-ending hedonic treadmill that paradoxically leads to misery. This belief reflects much of Christian-Judaic teaching. On the other hand he states, “Satisfaction is an emotion that captures the uniquely human need to impart meaning to one’s activities.” Berns illustrates these ideas, “While you might find pleasure by happenstance-winning the lottery, possessing the genes for a sunny temperament or having the luck not to live in poverty-satisfaction can arise only by the conscious decision to do something. And this makes all the difference in the world, because it is only your own actions for which you may take responsibility and credit.”

Recent research at the University of Oregon used brain scans using functional magnetic resonance imaging to study subjects that were given \$100 each. The volunteers were divided into two groups, one had money taken from them involuntarily like a tax for the

local food bank and the other group had the choice of how much of the money they wish to give to the local food bank. “Subjects had no choice in the tax like transfers of money to the charity, but they still experienced reward-related brain activity. Researchers also found that voluntary donations to the food bank triggered significantly more activity in the brain’s reward centers than occurred when people paid the same amount as a tax.” The voluntary donation is an example of that Berns called the conscious decision to do something.

What does all this mean to me as a practicing Christian? First I am blessed with a generally happy disposition. Yes, I am easily frustrated at times but not unhappy. I have learned not to compare myself with those who have more but with those who have less. By doing this I find myself blessed with abundance and willing to share that abundance. I am happy because I am satisfied. I am satisfied because I make a conscious decision to share what I have with my church and with others in need. Looking at what I give, whether it is on my bank statement or credit card statement, provides me with a reward each month. I find that when I increase my giving, I increase the good feeling that comes from being generous. I invite you to join me in making a conscious decision to be generous.

New Kitchen Crew Created

The Facilities and Parish Life Cluster have developed an outline of the duties of the new kitchen crew. This document is just the beginning of a new era of taking care of the kitchen and planning events which include food.

The kitchen crew will consist of three people partnering to make the kitchen run smoothly and food for events to be served smoothly and hospitably. The three “positions” are the kitchen coordinator, coffee hour coordinator, and housekeeping facilitator. Following are the duties and responsibilities of each person.

Kitchen Coordinator

- Work with other team members to accomplish all duties
- Fiscal management (all requests for kitchen expenditures must come to the kitchen coordinator before going to the cluster.)
- Inventory and stocking kitchen supplies
- Coordinate events with other team members
- Orient “newer” members of St. James’ to the kitchen as needed

Coffee Hour Coordinator

- Each week a different ministry will be responsible for the food for coffee hour. Clean-up and set –up are a necessary part of providing coffee hour.
- The ministries will sign up for the Sunday of their choice on a quarterly basis
- The Coffee Hour Coordinator will call the “point person” of the ministry a week in advance to remind them of their duties for the following Sunday
- Work with other team members to accomplish all duties
- Coordinate events with other team members

Housekeeping Facilitator

- Work with other team members to accomplish all duties
- Coordinate events with other team members

- Maintain cleanliness of kitchen
- Keep appliances in good working order
- Wash dish towels as needed.
- Coordinate general clean-up of the kitchen at least three times a year

It must be noted that each of these positions is an administrative position with few exceptions. It is the responsibility of each person in the St. James community to help when called upon if he/she is able.

Currently, the Kitchen Coordinator is Barbara Dabney, the Coffee Hour Coordinator is Pamela Young, and the Housekeeping Facilitator is Sandra Motley.

Please notice that it will take everyone in the community to make this work smoothly. We will be meeting soon to draw up a list of guidelines for the use of the kitchen. They will be made public as soon as possible. In the meantime, let us know if you have any suggestions.


Lynn Locher will lead a group discussion of our vision of ways that St. James' can better serve its members and the community and how we can eliminate any barriers to creating this vision.

Early Bird Bible Study Resumes




Early morning Bible Study begins on Tuesday, September 11, at 6 am. The hour long session is spent reading and discussing the Bible lessons for the following Sunday services.

If You Had to Give It All Away

“If you were given \$1 million today on the condition that you give it all way by midnight tonight, to whom would you give it?”

Draw a circle on blank sheet of paper and make a pie chart of whom you would give the money away to. There are no restrictions—you can give it to family, friends, charities, even the government. Carve out a slice of pie of any size to represent the portion you’d like to give to each favored recipient. Your imagination may be stirred as you think of those with whom you would like to share this bounty. After 5 minutes at this exercise, some participants may share some observations regarding their feelings, observations and internal process of deliberating how best to do this. Then look at your pie chart and ask yourself, “Does this reflect my plan for what would happen were I to die today?”

When Jesus in the gospels instructs the rich young man to give everything away, the shocking extremeness of this demand has always seemed unfair to me. However, then it occurred to me that there will be day in the next 100 years when each one of us will do exactly that: give it all away! Have you ever seen a hearse with a trailer hitch? I don’t think so. One day we will leave all our possessions behind, and to whom shall we leave them? A thoughtful estate plan reflects our own personal values. For most, this starts with family, but it does not end there.

Does your current will or trust reflect the pie chart you would create for how you would like to give it all away? Adjustments are always timely. Call the Gift Planning Office for referral to an estate planning attorney or for arrangement which may not require an attorney. “Follow the money.” Does it lead to your heart and reflect your values. “Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.” (Luke 12) Everyone enjoys giving gifts. This is likely your biggest chance to do so; but you will only get one shot at it, so use it to make a highly personal and generous statement.


