

A Note from the Junior Warden

We are looking toward a very active time in the life of our parish. While we do the work necessary to hire an Interim Rector, select a search committee, update our parish profile and begin our search for a new Rector, the Vestry is committed to continuing the daily work set before us. At the June Vestry meeting, the Vestry committed to finishing the following goals for the remainder of 2008:

- The restroom renovation will begin soon. We are awaiting bid revisions and once those are in hand we will be able to choose a contractor and begin the work.
- Concrete work will begin very soon. This includes a walkway from the parking lot to the education building and replacement of cracked and buckled walkways throughout the campus. This work also includes the installation of a conduit through which we can run wiring for new lighting around the education building and piping for future plumbing to that building.
- The second Sunday of each month at the 9 and 11 a.m. services will be a youth service, where both the music and the sermon will be geared toward children and teenagers.
- Disciple Builders, now called Faith Formation, has planned an exciting fall program, including a seminar event. Also, mark **December 7** on your calendars for Las Posadas.
- The Congregational Care cluster is exploring op-

tions for continuing our long-term ministry to Hillside Care, and is building a visitation team to bring a social event to the homes of St. James' members who are housebound.

- On June 8, Parish Life put on a wonderful celebration for our graduates and new members. Plans are in the works for ice cream socials, games nights, and other fun activities. Put **September 14** on your calendars for a back-to-school ice cream social on youth Sunday.
- The Communications/Evangelism cluster is planning a dinner for newcomers in the fall, and is putting together new welcome packets for visitors and updated pew cards.
- We are planning a new and exciting stewardship campaign for the fall. Details to follow at the appropriate time.

As you can see, we have much work before us. What I've listed above does not include the rest of work of the parish — the work of the Eucharistic visitors, Godly Play teachers, ushers, work party crews, concert coordinators, Comforters and rosary makers, choir and kitchen crews, those who serve on a variety of committees and who serve in so many ways in our community. While we are sad to see Bob leave St. James, we are entering an exciting time in the life of our parish. May we all take this opportunity to move forward with faith and enthusiasm.

St. James' Library



Before You Write a Check

Phone calls have been coming in from members of an East Bay parish who are in the midst of capital campaign and have heard from fellow members about the advantages of making their gift with shares of stock instead of cash. By donating stock, their fellow parishioners point out, they bypass capital gains taxes on the eventual sale of the stock, and they still get the same income tax deduction on the full value of the shares at the time they are transferred.

It is only mysterious if you haven't yet done it. Donating stock or mutual fund shares is simple to do and can save you on taxes. St. James' Endowment Fund has a brokerage account, and gifts are always welcome. Operating as well as building pledges to St. James' as well as bathroom renovation donations could also be made with stock and mutual funds. Gifts to Endowment are kept in perpetuity.

Things to keep in mind in donating mutual fund or stock shares:

- Request your investment representative to transfer the shares **in kind** into the church's account. This transfer out of your account may require your faxed signature.

- In the church's account, the shares will be sold **tax-free**.
- **Always** let the church know **in advance** how many of what shares you are donating, so that your gift will be properly credited. (Unlike your luggage, your shares do not have your name on them. Unless you tell your church, your shares may not be identified as belonging to you.)
- If you have questions, call Richard at the Gift Planning Office (415) 869-7812.

Once you discover the financial advantages of giving stock in place of cash, you may wish to open a Donor Advised Fund (DAF). A DAF (Episcopal Charities has one) lets you liquidate stock tax-free to use for all your charitable giving. For a brochure, contact the Gift Planning Officer.

So before you write a check, consider whether you can make this gift with stock. Your after-tax gift may be larger than you could have made with cash—and more satisfying. Smarter giving empowers generosity, and generosity is divine.

Climate Change, Sand Pies, and Corn-Fed Beef

As stewards of God's creation we're called to protect and sustain our open spaces, our water, our diversity of species. What about God's beloved people, our brothers and sisters around the world who are perishing from insufficient food at the rate of 30,000 per day? Our awareness of those dying of hunger and malnutrition has acquired an acute urgency of late: Grain prices soar, and global food reserves plummet. The food price index of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the U.N. has increased by over 50% in two years, threatening to push tens of millions of people into malnutrition. Food riots have occurred in 19 nations as the price of staples soars beyond reach for large segments of the population. Mothers in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, prepare sand pies seasoned with a little salt and fat to fill their children's stomachs.

The causes of the current global food shortage are manifold--a changing climate resulting in severe drought in Australia and Africa, conversion of wheat and soy acreage to corn and use of that corn for biofuel production, reduced yields due to pest damage in China and the Philippines, and a growing middle-class population eager for meat or for imported, non-traditional carbohydrate sources. President Bush and Presiding Bishop Jefferts-Schiori both opposed the recently passed Farm Bill, an omnibus piece of legislation that will determine US food policy for the next five years, as a missed opportunity for reform. The subsidy program in effect guarantees cheap raw materials to US food processors and biofuel manufacturers, while undercutting farmers in poor countries and farmers in the U.S. with family farms. The result: an estimated \$75 billion loss each year to African farmers alone, and a U.S. corn-based production of more calories than Americans can consume, 3500 per day per capita, buried in our diets as high fructose corn syrup and increased fat levels in corn-fed meat and fish.

What to do? Eat **less**, eat **local**, and eat **lower on the food chain**. Practice personal food security by growing some food in your own garden, even if only in a pot on your patio, and enjoying your local farmers' market. If you eat meat, substitute several meals a week with vegetarian alternatives, and use meat as a side dish, not a main course. At the supermarket, stick to the outer aisles and buy less processed food—if you can't name the food or animal source of the ingredients, don't buy it.

All of this change was exciting for the university but confusing for me as I tried to show my husband and granddaughters around. Thomas Wolf, a UNC graduate, said in "Look Homeward Angel" "You can't go home again." I felt that way during my brief visit.
